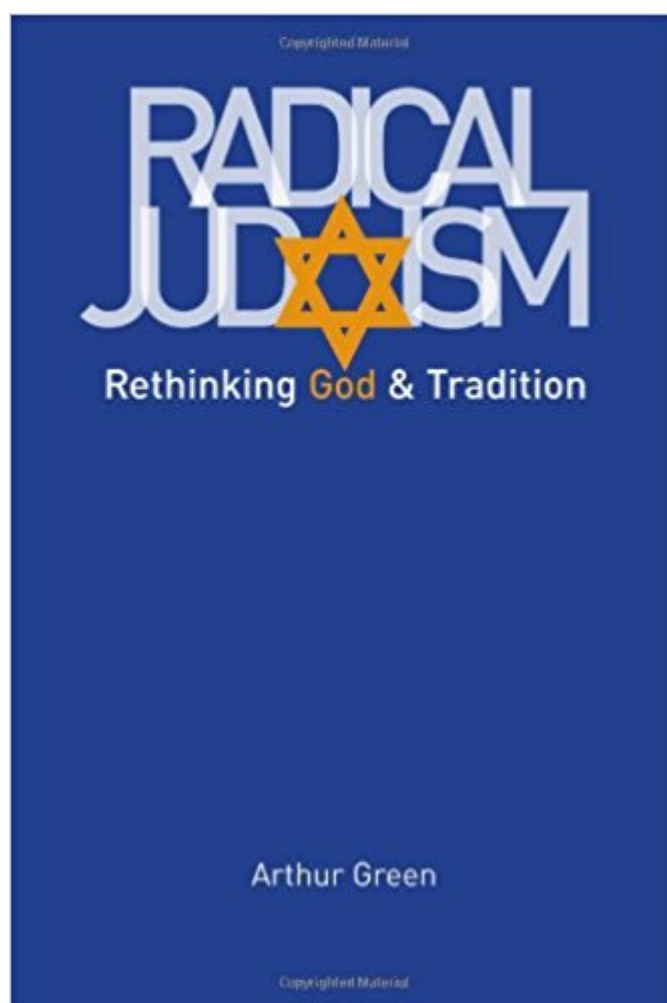


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# Radical Judaism: Rethinking God And Tradition (The Franz Rosenzweig Lecture Series)

For those like me who have trouble reconciling evolutionary science with the biblical creation story, and for those of us who see a contradiction between the deliverance of the complete Torah (with its telling of the future trials of the Israelites) and free will, this book was a real revelation. Rabbi Green provides a much-needed alternative to blind acceptance.
