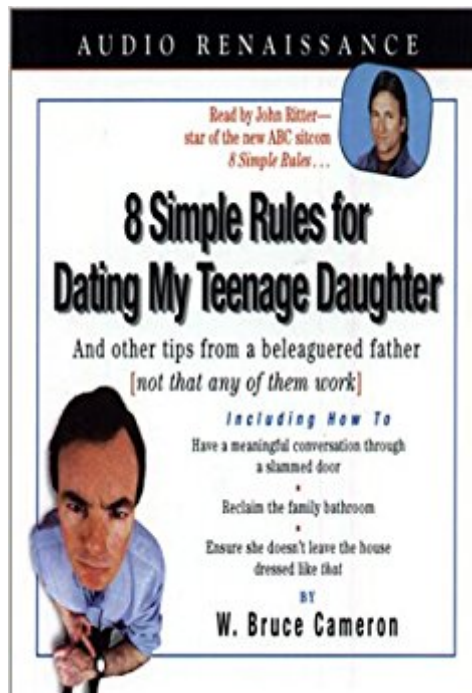




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8 Simple Rules For Dating My Teenage Daughter

A comic survival guide to being a parent of teenage daughters, Bruce Cameron's book started life in 1995 as a wildly, and accidentally, successful Internet column. In short, sharply observed vignettes, he touches a middle-aged-male nerve by describing the rage and bewilderment of having little girls turn into teenage monsters, but every complaint is punctured by a self-deprecating regular-guy-in-a-mad-world irony. There are helpful hints (or rather, unhelpful ones, because Cameron admits that nothing will make any difference) for coping with the telephone, clothes, parties, car you used to own, and boyfriend you don't want her to hang around with. It's all rather reminiscent of Dave Barry, though of course Cameron's canvas is smaller, and for that reason alone, many readers will find that a whole book is a stretch. This is definitely a bathroom browse rather than material for reading cover to cover--assuming it's possible to get into the bathroom, that is; according to the author, this is a coveted parking space for strange aliens who paint themselves for hours while dreaming of Brad Pitt. --Richard Farr --This text refers to an out of print or

Here to help fathers stay afloat during their daughters' adolescence is humor columnist W. Bruce Cameron with *8 Simple Rules for Dating My Teenage Daughter, and Other Tips from a Beleaguered Father (Not That Any of Them Work)*. In a chapter called "It's Her Party and I'll Cry if I Want To," he explains that teen parties are unnecessary because "[y]our daughters do not need to be made any more excited than they already are. W. Bruce Cameron's books are my favorites. This is a somewhat old one that certainly exhibits his wonderful sense of humor. Most of his other works revolve around dogs in one way or another, and are tops on my list.

As a father of three teenage girls myself, I commiserated with his hilarious descriptions of radical mood swings, theatrical expressions, rolling eyes, exaggerated sighs and "that's not my job" attitudes. The conversations he chronicles with his kids will keep you in stitches. Written specifically for fathers, I wound up reading many of the passages aloud to my wife and my righteously indignant daughters. My wife and I laughed so hard tears came to our eyes as we saw our own girls aptly described in this hard to put down book. *Eight Simple Rules* was so funny, I purchased copies for other DODOs (dads of daughters only) that I know. This book is a

must read for any man who already shares bathroom space with a teenage girl -- or for some poor soul who may someday try to raise one.

I love this book, having already read it before buying this audio. Bonus that it is read by the late John Ritter, the dad from the TV show of the same name. W. Bruce Cameron's fatherly wisdom is humorous, creating a bonding between my daughter's and I who now joke about the topics he discusses.
